And in a tremendous spontaneous gesture, enough money was collected to sponsor two more hives. This included a very generous donation from one individual member.

Bee Health Strategy

There surely cannot be a bee keeper who is not aware of DEFRA's draft bee health strategy. In their words, it sets out to 'address the challenges facing beekeepers given their important role as custodians of honey bees'.

The document outlines the Government's thoughts on five key areas, including 'Effective biosecurity' and 'Good standards of beekeeping and husbandry'.

As a Branch of D.B.K.A. we were invited to contribute to the Association's response, but we went beyond that and submitted our own response directly to DEFRA. Time will tell what impact anyone's comments will have, but we will keep you informed.

High Standards at Holsworthy Honey Show

For the Branch, the end of the bee keeping year is marked by our annual honey show. This year's show, held on Saturday, 25th October, was again hosted by Mole Valley Farmers at their Holsworthy store.

Despite a very difficult year, even worse than 2007 for many beekeepers, a creditable number of entries were received, resulting in a very impressive show of the craft of beekeeping.

As a justified reward for the quality of his excellent entries across a number of classes, Andrew Sluggett walked away with every major trophy.

Of particular note was the Stanley Rowland Cup awarded to the beekeeper with the most points from the honey classes. This year marks the seventy-fifth anniversary of its first appearance at the honey show. It was therefore very fitting that Stanley Rowland's son, James, was on hand to present this and other trophies.

Andrew Sluggett's clean sweep of the show prizes was only challenged by Christopher Smith whose honey won its particular class and then went on to win 'best in show'. The show's novice cup was won by Elaine Smith in her very first year of entering.

A significant number of the entries were subject of some very favourable comments from the show judge, Steve Ide from Exmouth, who regularly judges at Devon County Show. He remarked that the standard of the actual products and their presentation was very high, and was keen to encourage more local beekeepers to participate in
